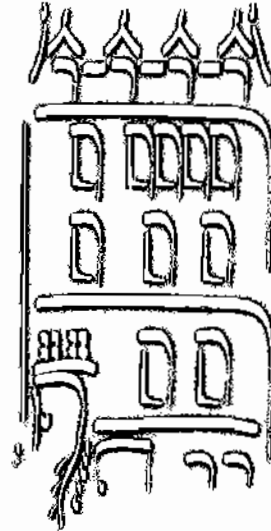

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Dear Friends,

This story is ascribed alternately to Dov Ber, the Magid of Mezritch, and to the tzaddik Rabbi Mordecai of Nadvorna:

The Magid was walking in the street a few days before Rosh Hashanah, and saw one of his disciples rushing furiously in the opposite direction. The Magid stopped him, and asked him where he was going. The man replied, "I am the service leader for the holidays. I must get home to look at the prayerbook and put my prayers in order." The Magid replied, "The prayerbook is the same as it was last year. It would be better for you to look at your deeds, and put yourself in order."

There is a lot of pressure at this time of year. We have the responsibility and the opportunity to do some serious self-reflection and hopefully, gain insight into how we can renew ourselves. Like the disciple in the story, I frequently feel overcome by pressing details that obscure more important issues. I pray that all of us, in these Ten Days of Return and in the coming year, have the chance for some quiet focus on what is most important to us.

On Rosh Hashanah, I will have spoken about the renewal of our community through a shared vision of increasing levels of connection, and also of the need to allow ourselves the broadest possible range of personal theologies. To both of these ends, I want to encourage everyone to participate in a course we are offering at the Temple. Beginning on October 15, on five successive Wednesday evenings from 7 to 8:15 pm, we will discuss the text *Finding God: Ten Jewish Responses*. This will be a wonderful way for us to learn about many of the

EARLY FRIDAY SERVICES ADDITION

For the coming year, we will add the third Friday of the month to the already existing first Friday as an early 6 pm service. On many of these Kabbalat Shabbat evenings, the service will be followed by a congregational dinner. (Advance reservations required).

SHARING SHAABAT

The earlier and briefer service (one hour approximately) will allow families and friends to share Shabbat dinner either within the Temple facility or elsewhere or just to relax at home together. There will be no Torah reading on these Fridays and services will be conducted from the Bimah. Since B'nei Mitzvah services always include a Torah reading on Saturday mornings, the Rabbi estimates that there should be an average of three Torah

ways Jews, from Bible until modern times, have understood and talked about God. My hope is that through this study, we will find new ways of relating to God, or to the universe, ourselves. Participants are asked to read the two chapters we will discuss each week ahead of time. I love to teach about theology; I guess that is because I feel a long way from being done with my own search. I know the discussions in class will be very stimulating. I encourage the faithful and the doubters among us to consider joining the group. Texts will be available for purchase at the Temple, and you can always get it online or in bookstores as well (UAHC Press, Sonsino and Syme, authors). Please acquire a copy in advance of the first session and read the first two chapters to prepare for the first class.

Another opportunity afforded us by our new home will be some very high-energy dancing on Simchat Torah. This is a chance for children and adults of every age to celebrate and have a wonderful time together. We will have some gorgeous music with the full EET Holiday All-Stars ensemble. We will break in the new sanctuary in fine style.

I hope many of us will be together for the class, for Sukkot and for Simchat Torah, and I look forward to a year of excitement and renewal in our Temple life and our own spiritual lives. May it be a year of sweetness and peace for us, for all Israel, and all the world.



CANTOR'S . . . Hayley Kobilinsky

I have previously written about "Mi Sinai" tunes, that is, very old melodies reserved for specific places in a service that are believed by some to have been handed down along with the Torah at Mount Sinai. Examples of "Mi Sinai" tunes include Kol Nidre, and the Great Aleinu, a different melody from the Aleinu we sing in regular Shabbat and weekday services.

This Yom Kippur, you may notice that, when we sing the Great Aleinu, I do not just bend at the waist, which we usually do upon singing "VaAnachnu Kor'im" (And we bend), but rather, I will kneel on the floor and prostrate completely. This Ashkenazic (from Eastern European Jews) tradition may sound strange and surprise you, but it is written about in the Talmud. It is a vestige of the bowing custom practiced by the Priests in the Temple period. We retain the custom for during the Great Aleinu on High Holy Days only, as they are unique among all other services.

Finally, I would like to congratulate September's Bat Mitzvah, Becky Greene, and her family! Mazal Tov!

Ritual: 1. The established form for a ceremony; the order of words prescribed for a religious ceremony. 2a. Ritual observance: a system of rites. b. A ceremonial act or action. c. Any formal and customarily repeated act or series of acts. (Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary, 1977, p. 1000).

Many of you may know that I have moved out of the temple neighborhood to Queens. I naturally wanted to check out the local temple, which happens to be right across the street from my new home. The service that I went to was a Torah service, held on a Saturday morning. This is a Conservative temple (supposedly). From start to finish, the whole service took 20 minutes - including the Torah reading! There was no English in the service. Neither the rabbi nor the cantor faced the congregation or gave page numbers. If you weren't familiar with the "ritual" and/or didn't read Hebrew (it was quite obvious that most of the women didn't) the question that ran through my head was "Why am I here??"

Rituals and Meaning

When ritual becomes rote, it loses meaning. Our rituals are millennia old and they are not to be forgotten. If we forget, we cease being a people, cease having a heritage. How important it is, though, to understand the meaning behind our rituals, our prayers and to bring them with us into the 21st century. To create worship that calls to our temple community as a whole as well as to the individuals that make up our community.

That is the purpose of the East End Temple Ritual Initiative. Each of our meetings begins with a study portion led by Rabbi Adelson to help us understand our rituals. This is followed by an agenda that can include any ritual/worship issue that has become important to individuals and/or the congregation. Everyone in the congregation is welcome to attend our meetings. However, we are in need of congregants who will become official members of the committee. Responsibilities of membership include attending meetings every six weeks and on an as-needed basis. Also, additional people are needed to help coordinate the assignment of honors during High Holidays and at other religious Temple functions.

If someone asks you why you are here at East End Temple, I hope your answer will be "To learn, to grow, to share". Please contact me with your comments and suggestions for our next meeting to be held on Tuesday, October 28th, @ 7 pm.

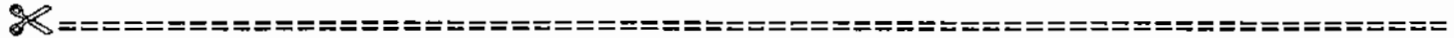

Labor/Management Arbitration is Herb's current professional hat, though by no means his only area of expertise. Armed with a BA from Dartmouth and an MBA from NYU, Herb began a career trajectory that took him to positions in London and Paris and back to New York as: a strategist in The Office of Strategic Services (forerunner to the C.I.A.); an Editor at Scholastic Magazine; an Executive Board Member at

Herb knew that he had met his match with Dorothy Sachs Levine, another intellectually curious, 'can-do' type of person who gave him 28 years of blissful marriage and friendship. In her memory, and in keeping with Herb's exuberance for making life matter, he has created a loving tribute to Dorothy who "never undertook anything with half measures or fearful restraint". It sounds like Dorothy also found her equal in Herb.
